

Again [Jesus] asked, “What shall I compare the kingdom of heaven to? It is like yeast that a woman took and mixed into about sixty pounds of flour until it worked all through the dough. (Matthew 13:33)

As we slowly awake from the sluggishness of the sugar-comas that we've voluntarily endured this Christmas season, perhaps the last thing we want to hear about are more baked goods. Yet I put before you this tiny parable concerning God's kingdom. What is the Kingdom of God like?

Over the next several months (right up to the cusp of Easter) we will be considering what the God's kingdom is like through the lens of Jesus' Sermon on the

Mount. We will examine how some small act done in faith magnifies the love of God -- how in the secret of a human heart God's reign can become perfect. The Kingdom of God is God's future breaking into humanity's present, slowly transforming us into New Creation.

The good news of God's kingdom is that God is turning right-side-up our up-side-down world through the work of the Messiah. Jesus shows the way and provides the means by which we can live faithfully for God in the here and now; can live faithfully in our present world. The Sermon on the Mount assures us that we are not simply waiting around until we die and go to heaven, but rather that God has called for us to live with purpose -- called us to be a yeast that invests the whole dough with leaven. We are to be agents of God's New Creation; we are to be agents of God's kingdom.

What's more, this is not only something that we are to study and talk about, but rather are called to live. Valmont Church has the grave and wonderful mission of being God's people for this present world. We are invited to be agents in God's right-side-up activity in the greater Boulder area. We are truly honored, for we have a calling from God to

participate in God's saving activity. We are truly honored, for we have been brought together to announce God's kingdom!

I look forward to this year together of being God's leaven for this world. I pray that we will look for ways to challenge and encourage one another as we all listen and look for the Holy Spirit's guidance. The Kingdom of God is arriving, so let us look for ways to support its movement into our world.





Music is an integral component of worship at Valmont. Eric has clarity concerning musical choices: its role is to reinforce or echo the sermon's theme or church calendar. This function is readily illustrated in our music for Advent and Epiphany.

On the first Sunday of Advent, we prepared the church for the season. Each symbol was emphasized in a musical selection. The paramounts' colors reflected "preparing" and the choir echoed that with "keep your lamps trimmed and burning... the time is drawing nigh." The evergreen with its eternality and undying nature was reflected in *O Tannenbaum* while the lights—Advent candles and those throughout the sanctuary—came into musical representation in *Light of the World*. That particular anthem also reminded us that the Advent candles are the true light—Christ.

Moving into the rest of the season's themes of peace, joy and love, specific lines from the songs' lyrics highlight those themes. We heard (and sang) "there's a great joy 'comin'" and "Love, the Rose/Love, the Christ is on the way."

We conclude this most joyous season with Epiphany. The choir will share *In the Bleak Midwinter* whose last verse embodies a revelation and epiphanial moment of faith:

"What can I give Him, poor as I am?

If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb;

If I were a wise man, I would do my part;

Yet what I can I give Him: Give my heart."

Sausage and Tortellini Soup

Ingredients:

- * 2 14-1/2-ounce cans Italian-style stewed tomatoes
- * 3 cups water
- * 2 cups loose-pack frozen cut green beans or Italian-style green beans
- * 1 10-1/2-ounce can condensed French onion soup
- * 8 ounces fully cooked smoked turkey or pork sausage, halved lengthwise and cut into 1/2-inch slices
- * 2 cups packaged shredded cabbage with carrot (coleslaw mix)
- * 1 9-ounce package refrigerated cheese-filled tortellini
- * Shaved or shredded Parmesan cheese 1 large zucchini, quartered

Instructions

1. In a 4- or 5-quart slow cooker combine undrained tomatoes, water, frozen green beans, onion soup, and turkey sausage.
2. Cover; cook on low-heat setting for 8 to 10 hours or on high-heat setting for 4 to 5 hours.
3. If using low-heat setting, turn slow cooker to high-heat setting. Stir cabbage and tortellini into soup. Cover; cook for 15 minutes more. Garnish soup with shavings of Parmesan cheese or shredded Parmesan cheese. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

For three years, Mitch locked his home from the outside. He worked nights and weekends to make improvements to his storm damaged home, but progress had stalled. Just five months ago he was still living with his grandmother.

Mitch survived the Joplin tornado, but in many ways, he has been unable to move on. As his home stood vacant, and still showed the scars left by the tornado, he was constantly reminded of that tragic day.

Two weeks ago, we welcomed Mitch home at our 180th housewarming ceremony. This was a celebration not only for Mitch and his family, but the 179 families who came before him who were also spending that day in a safe, secure home. Thanks to you, we did this!

We're proud to announce that Rebuild Joplin has completed its mission. Every family on our waiting list is now home, and all signs point to a recovered and healing Joplin community.

As we celebrate the work accomplished in Joplin, we recognize that throughout the country, thousands of homeowners continue to lock the doors to their home from the outside. Next week, we'll send tools and supplies to St. Bernard Project affiliates in Rockaway, New York and Monmouth County, New Jersey. 

Dear Valmonters,

We were in the Fellowship Hall after giving a recent update about our Wycliffe recruitment work when someone said, “*Where do all these people come from?*” Just goes to show we are sometimes too close to our work to make things clear. Maybe others of you also wonder where our recruits come from. Here’s a thumbnail answer.



For the most part they come via any or many of these: *Christian families, schools, churches, colleges, clubs* (in both Christian and secular universities), *campus, conferences, children’s work* like VBS, Child Evangelism Fellowship and others, plus *Christian media (both regular and social), etc., etc.*

In other words, faithful Christian institutions, under God, are the *real* recruiters. As stewards of biblical (i.e., missional) values transmission, they together encourage lifelong obedience to God in everything. So it’s no surprise when some people sense from early childhood that God is nudging them toward missions. For others it’s a journey of discovery. But regardless, few potential recruits know how to “get there from here”—and the journey is always uphill. Many never make it as a result....

So potential recruits are plentiful, thanks mainly to our Christian institutions. But people to help them get where God wants them are very scarce! That’s where we come in. We follow up on the investments of Christian institutions by helping potential recruits discern the next good step in the often complex placement process. It’s mainly about guidance for the journey, born of our personal experience, in the light of current information, laced with prayer and encouragement.
