February 17, 2010

Treasurer's Report:

Income YTD: \$11,599.90 (General Offering: \$8,913.00; Interest Earned: \$1,161.90; Memorial Gifts: \$1,525.00). Expenses: \$8,585.65. General Operating Overage: \$327.35

IT WAS VOTED: Of the \$1,525.00 Strickler Memorial Fund, \$300 is allocated to the Music Program and \$1,225.00 is allocated to the Valmont Amateur Astronomy Group, taking into consideration the family's wishes.

IT WAS VOTED: \$300 of grocery card money will be allocated to the Nurturing line item for the 2010 budget.

IT WAS VOTED: A \$400 scholarship was approved to allow a congregant to participate in the Houma mission trip.

IT WAS VOTED: \$250 of the 2010 mission trip scholarship will be allocated from grocery card income. The balance of \$150 will be allocated from the special offering authorized for the trip.



IT WAS VOTED (with Joyce Glazier abstaining): The Wurlitzer piano will be given to Ashley Glazier contingent upon her arranging to have the piano moved.

Pig Roasts and Potlucks

Cheese-&-Spinach-Stuffed Portobellos

* 1/2 cup finely shredded Parmesan cheese,

Ingredients:

- 4 large portobello mushroom caps
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper, divided
- 1 cup finely chopped fresh spinach
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped kalamata olives
- ♦ 3/4 cup prepared marinara sauce

Preparation: Serves 4

- 1. Preheat oven to 450°F. Coat a rimmed baking sheet with cooking spray.
- 2. Place mushroom caps, gill-side up, on the prepared pan. Sprinkle with salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Roast until tender, 20 to 25 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, mash ricotta, spinach, 1/4 cup Parmesan, olives, Italian seasoning and the remaining 1/8 teaspoon pepper in a medium bowl. Place marinara sauce in a small bowl, cover and microwave on High until hot, 30 seconds to 1 1/2 minutes.
- 4. When the mushrooms are tender, carefully pour out any liquid accumulated in the caps. Return the caps to the pan gill-side up. Spread 1 tablespoon marinara into each cap; cover the remaining sauce to keep warm. Mound a generous 1/3 cup ricotta filling into each cap and sprinkle with the remaining 1/4 cup Parmesan. Bake until hot, about 10 minutes. Serve with the remaining marinara sauce.







NEWS all the way from Timbuktu—yeah really!


Nouh pastors a little fellowship in Timbuktu where believers are definitely a minority. The spiritual climate there can be discouraging and dangerous, and he has been persecuted for his faith by family and many others. Pastor Nouh saw that his flock needed the foundation of Scripture in the Tamasheq language and requested help to bring that about.

One day a highly esteemed warrior/officer came a distance to see Nouh. He reported that hundreds of people in the northern desert saw the same vision: a man, hovering above the ground, holding a book. They all identified the man as Jesus. Visions are foundational in this culture, and interpreters of visions are revered; but that this officer came to a Christian pastor for vision interpretation was unheard of! "I was sincerely nervous!" Nouh laughs. "I just tried to keep calm and share what I know about the coming back of Jesus."

Later, the owner of a local radio station asked Pastor Nouh to talk about the return of Jesus on the radio, which launched a weekly broadcast. The program met a deep hunger in

many listeners and soon Pastor Nouh was being asked to teach at schools, hotels, offices, and even a university.

God has been preparing Tamasheq hearts for His written Word, and you can be a part of His unfolding story by praying for them, the translation, and Nouh. No doubt it was prayer that brought Jesus to them in a vision—a way that uniquely matches their culture.... Stu & Edith Nelson
