Promised Land hopes in a Kingdom of God Reality

We all want the Promised Land. We deeply desire to live in a house we did not build, drink from wells we did not dig and gather grapes we did not plant (Deut 6:10-12). God's promise to Israel greatly appeals to Americans today. We want the maximum reward for minimum effort. But God's promise wasn't to Americans...it was to a barely cohesive band of people who were mostly of Abrahamic descent. They'd been in slavery for nearly 400 years and they had no sense of national pride or any concept of how to pull themselves up

"by their boot straps." Apart for being sandal clad, they had little idea of what life without orders entailed.

Instead of dwelling in the land flowing with milk and honey, we're informed, "in this world we will have trouble" (John 16:33). Peter tells us that we are destined to live as aliens and strangers in this world (1 Pt 2:11), and yet we strive (sometimes with ridiculous effort) to make a home in this world.

Instead of finding ease, we've found this path very hard. And are we surprised (John15:18, 1 Peter 4:12, 1 John 3:13).

"In this world you will have trouble..." Check!

Perhaps because we don't understand the utter beauty of Jesus' life advice: "BUT take heart, I have over come the world." 3500 years ago, God gave a people who were landless, slaves standing and a home. And we long for that... stability. But we forget how many generations were promised a home in Canaan that never saw the fulfillment of that promise.

Years ago one generation of many generations of slaves got to experience freedom. Because those who can before them prayed fervently for it! Today I wonder what God is calling this generation to pray for...

I think we can learn so much from the words of Jeremiah to the exiled Israelites:

Build homes, and plan to stay. Plant gardens, and eat the food they produce. Marry and have children. Then find spouses for them so that you may have many grandchildren. Multiply! Do not dwindle away! And work for the peace and prosperity of the city where I sent you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, for its welfare will determine your welfare." - Jeremiah 29:5-7

Pig Roasts and Potlucks

Zucchini in Cream Dill Sauce from the Kitchen of Elaine

Makes 6 servings

Ingredients:

- 2 1/4 pounds unpaired zucchini, cut in strips (7 cups) onion
- ♦ 1/2 cup water
- 1 ts instant chicken bullion granules
- 2 TB butter, melted
- ◆ 1 ts lemon juice
- ◆ 1/2 cup dairy sour cream

- * 1/4 cup finely chopped
- * 1 tp salt
- * 1/2 ts dried dillweed
- * 2 ts sugar
- * 2 TB all purpose flour



In a saucepan, combine zucchini, onion, water, salt, bouillon and dillweeds; bring to boiling. Reduce heat; simmer, covered for five minutes or until zucchini is just tender. DO NOT DRAIN. Add butter, sugar and lemon juice and remove from heat. Blend flour into sour cream. Stir about half the cooking liquid into the sour cream; return all to saucepan. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly.



Buddy's Blueberry Pie from the Kitchen of Ella

Makes 1 to 16 servings

Line a 9 inch pie plate with pastry.

Combine 4 cups fresh or frozen blueberries with 3/4 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons of flour, 1/2 tsp. grated lemon peel, dash of salt, 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Fill pie shell. Sprinkle with 1/2 tsps. lemon juice; dot with 1 tbsp. butter. Adjust top crust.

Bake at 400 degrees 35-40 minutes. Best served warm, and, of course, with ice cream.







PDA and Valmont

Because of the number of homes damaged or destroyed in last fall's, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is setting up camps to provide lodging and cooking facilities in our area. St Andrews church will be the site of a PDA camp in Boulder and Valmont church (as well as 1st Pres) are teaming up with them to help with the hosting duties during the summer months that their camp is open. Valmont will take 3 or 4 weeks over the summer and be the hosts for those weeks.

Hosting duties will include meeting with the incoming teams, being available to help answer questions and providing general help as needed during this week. We will also be hosting a Wednesday night potluck at Valmont to provide the team with a home-cooked meal during their work week.

Our first week of hosting will be the week of June 21-28. This week will be special as a number of us will be going out to the work sites to help with the rebuilding in addition to providing the hosting. Stephen and Dottyanne and Stephen's sister Diane and her husband Allen are all coming into town to help on the job sites this week. There are also a number of people from Valmont who will be working on the job sites this week.

How can you participate?

Consider volunteering on the job site one or more days the week of June 21-28. As we are local, you don't need to commit to the full week and you can go home to your own bed every evening.

Consider helping Ruth Lewis with the cooking. She has graciously volunteered to shop for and cook the evening meals this week. She will need assistance and this is a great way to help out the teams.

Consider being a member of Valmont's hosting team. St Andrews will be providing some training of what needs to be done as a host. There probably won't be too much work involved and you don't need to necessarily be a member of the hosting team each of the 3 or 4 times Valmont does it.


