Ingredients

- * 3 C Cherry Tomatoes halved * 8 oz fresh small Mozz cheese balls 1 lb cooked pasta
- 1 lb Salami/summer sausage-cut in small cubes
- * 3/4 C Kalmata olives sliced

3/4 C sliced Pepperoncini peppers

* 1/2 C Sliced red onions

- 1/2 C Fresh parsley, Chopped * 1 C Marinated Artichoke hearts

Dressing

- 3/4 C olive oil
- * 2 Tb white or red vinegar
- * 2 Tb water

- 1 Tb coarse salt
- * 1 cloves garlic chopped
- * 1 1/2 tsp sugar

- 1 tsp dry oregano
- * 1 tsp dry basil

*Any fresh herbs, chives, parsley desired

Preparation:

Toss all ingredients, use immediately or refrigerate up to 2—4 days

HIGHLANDS HIGHLIGTS

Highlands – A Sanctuary for the Spirit, a School for the Mind, a Joy for the Heart and a Shelter in the Storm.

Highlands is going through an exceedingly difficult time. The Council of Plains and Peaks Presbytery has accepted the resignation of Maria Shupe, the Executive Director of the camp and retreat center. Her last day was June 18 following fifteen years of serving in that position. Many accomplishments were achieved under her leadership. The mortgage on the retreat center was paid off for the Presbytery in 2020. At the beginning of 2016, the balance was \$1,279,354. This was accomplished by several Highlands donors who named the camp and retreat center in their wills. Currently, Highlands has over two million dollars in their cash and investment accounts. An investment committee was formed to oversee the investments. The committee was formed with individuals who are bankers and knowledgeable in investments. New paddle boats and mountain bikes have been purchased with donations for the benefits of guests. Highlands is in the best financial condition than it has ever been!!

The council has hired an interim Executive Director to serve until the end of October. His name is Terry Buchanan from the Denver Presbytery.

Several family camps are scheduled for June and July. These will be held in the retreat center with activities for the adults and children. There will be a limit of 4-5 families which would work with the COVID regulations.

The state is planning on closing highway 7 for approximately one year. They are going to reconstruct the highway from Lyons to Highway 72. This will increase commute times for staff and guests.

Please keep the ministry of Highlands in your prayers!! Also please pray for Maria as she makes this difficult transition along with the many donors, the hard-working staff, and the Highlands Camp Committee!!

Over the past few days I've been thinking a lot about being "blessed". Many times when I respond to "How are you?" by saying, "I'm blessed", I get a bemused look in return--as if to say, "I'll humor her, she's probably past her expiration date."

I also could choose to sit in my recliner, a straight-backed chair, rocking chair, or sit on my patio with my coffee and books.

When it was time to go to church, I only had to turn the key n the ignition--no clutch, or choke to worry about, put the car in gear N drive the 15-20 minutes to worship with friends in a beautiful setting. For lunch I could choose something from pantry, refrigerator, or freezer, OR I could drive to a variety of restaurants and/or grocery stores, where I would have innumerable choices of what to eat.

Prior to moving to Colorado, I had been widowed after having been married for 42 years to a man who loved me enough to raise my 5 boys from previous marriage. I still have many family members and friends who love and care for me. Also, I have been treated well by the medical community. And, best of all, I am a daughter of the King.

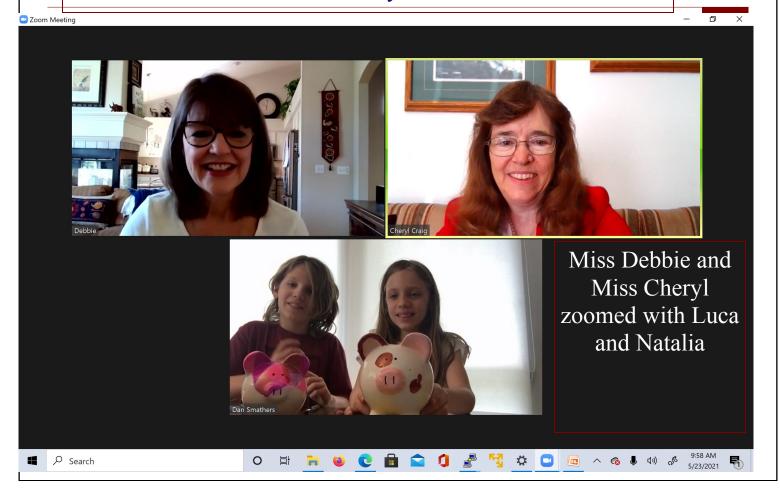

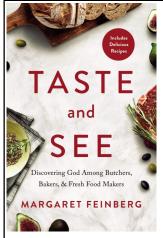




Church Library

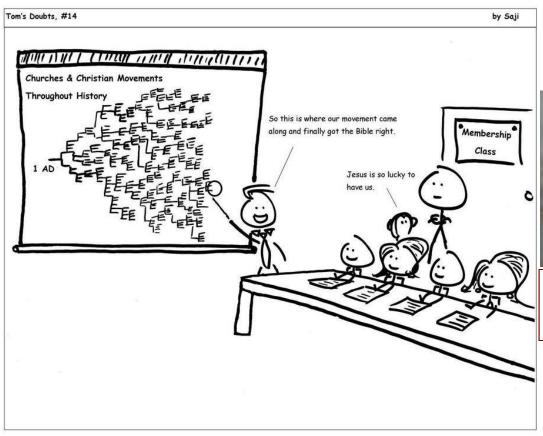


Women's Association
