Growing up, I didn't know much about the Christian Calendar. I was aware of Advent and Christmas (although the two of them largely blurred together). My church would celebrate Palm Sunday and Easter, and even mentioned Pentecost in passing upon occasion. Lent, however, was completely foreign to me until high school when it seemed to begin gaining in popularity in Evangelical circles.



NI knew people who'd give up chocolate or maybe a type of meat for the season, leaving the distinct

impression that Lent was essentially a time for Christian dieting or a second go at New Year's resolutions. In truth. those acts of renunciation didn't make much sense to me at the time. Nor did it

seem like it was having a profound effect on my friends who chose to fast from novel food groups.

Lent may be many things, but novel is not one of them. In fact, as I came back to faith, the season of Lent and its invitation for fasting and penitence became essential for my experience of Easter. Taking forty days to prepare myself for the jarring experience of jumping between Good Friday and Easter helped me bridge the gap between the feeling of searing loss and exultant joy because I'd done the prayerful work of considering what I allowed to separate me from God. Whether it was my pride, my desire for comfort, my benefit from injustice, or whatever it else might be — Lent allowed for me to see this in clear relief against the scene of Jesus' crucifixion. It allowed for me ask for the freedom of New Creation — that New Creation might

prohibiting you from clearly seeing your need. May your sense of who God is be heightened through this time of penitence and fasting. May your vision be cleared, so that you can see anew what Jesus is accomplishing in his march towards Calvary.





- ◆ 1/3 c canola oil
- ◆ 1 c quick oats
- 3 c of cheerios
- * 1/4 c butter or margarine
- * 1 tsp vanilla
- * 1 tsp baking soda
- * 1 c of raisins

- * 2 eggs
- * 1 1/2 c flour
- * 1/2 tsp salt

GIFT CARD MINISTRY

Did you know that gift cards are an important part of the ministry here at Valmont. The proceeds from the gift card sales are used to augment the finances used by the deacons and some other projects. Even if you do not shop at Safeway, all of the gift cards available at the Safeway "Gift Card Mall" are available to you to purchase with the gift cards you purchase at Valmont, We are working convince King Soopers too.

The church purchases Safeway and King Soopers cards at a 5% discount and sells them to you at face value. Gift cards are easier to use than either cash or credit cards. We accept cash and checks for the purchases. If you are willing to help by selling the cards to your relatives or neighbors let me know and I will explain how to do it. We buy all of our gasoline using these cards and it seems we use a lot. Most of the newer Safeway and King Soopers stores have these gas stations. We seem to eat out a lot

too. So we buy gift cards for the restaurants we use the most. Do you purchase on Amazon, use an Amazon gift card! Fixing up the house? Use Home Depot or Lowe's.

Trash - Again? More on what is trash?

It is hard to know anymore. We have three bins dedicated to Valmont trash. There are now signs over each bin to help you know what is what! Take time to look at them.


Recycle: Most of you recognize that we can recycle some items like soda cans, food tins, ball of aluminum foil and plastic (with triangle number). Those of course go in our Recycle bin.

Compost: Here is a new system we have not had before. Compost includes most carbon based material, here is a partial list: All food, napkins, paper towels, compostable plastic bags and plastic ware (made out of corn oil!) but no other plastics; paper plates that do not have plastic, purchase only paper products that are compostable.

Trash (Land Fill): This is sort of simple, if it isn't in those two lists it is trash. Consider: if food is caked on recycle items it is trash. Or wash it of (90% or better) of cans because they will be melted down. Plastic though should not have any food. Here is another if to consider: Clorox types of wipes are not paper but are really plastic and are trash and "paper" coffee cups and plastic and paper.

HIGHLANDS HIGHLIGTS

Highlands – A Sanctuary for the Spirit, a School for the Mind, a Joy for the Heart and a Shelter in the Storm.

The cold weather has brought to light some issues at Highlands. The retreat center was built 16 years ago. The domestic hot water boilers were installed at that time and have developed some major issues. The staff is getting quotes for replacing the two boilers. The current boilers are rated at 80% efficiency. The quotes are for boilers rated at 95% efficient. The other problem that has developed is a significant leak in the water system. The staff has spent a great deal of time trying to locate the leaks in buried lines. Hopefully they will find the leaks and get them repaired within the next couple of weeks. In the meantime, water is being purchased to have enough for the guest groups that are scheduled. Having to purchase water costs \$2,000 for 18,000 gallons. Guests are being very good about helping to conserve water. The kitchen staff is using bottled water and paper products to reduce dish washing. This last week, Maria received notification that two of the trusts from the Jane Hayes estate, will have partial distributions within the next two weeks. One trust is valued at \$2 million and the other is approximately \$5 million. Highlands is to receive 20% of each trust. The amounts of the partial distribution have not been specified in the documentation, but the timing of the distribution is a true blessing!!

Please keep the ministry of Highlands in your prayers along with the very generous donors, the hard-working staff, the volunteers and the Highlands Camp Committee!! They do an amazing job to keep Highlands running!!
