As surely as winter must follow autumn, so too does the Christian calendar lead us into Lent following the joys of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. Before we can experience the Hallelujah's and He-Is-Risen's of Easter, we must don the ashes of dust-to-dust and the realization that our voice calls for Jesus to be crucified. Seen in isolation, Lent seems cruel to the point of absurdity. Understood in the movement of the Christian year, it is not the defeat of God's plans for the world, but the very path to victory (no matter how unexpected it might be).


So too with our chosen study for this Lenten season. Jonah, a prophet offered by Jesus. Our journey of the Lord, chooses disobedience and disdain throughout what little we know of his ministerial career, and yet something unique is revealed about the Lord through this oddity of prophetic literature. God's prophet is faithless; God is faithful. God's prophet is without mercy; God is merciful. God's prophet is quick to anger and abounding in steadfast hate. God proves to be the opposite. Yet God uses fallen humanity to redeem fallen humanity. God does not reject, but redeems the lost through the lost.

How might we look backwards on the unusual path of Lent by way of its eventual destination? What do our acts of renunciation and devotion teach us about the God who chooses to be revealed on the cross? How are our Lenten disciplines and practices transfigured by Jesus' persistent march to Calvary?

I pray that we all might heed Kierkegaard's words this Lent. Let us live this season in the moment, trusting that God will reveal meaning, purpose, and transformation to us as we come to our journey's end. Let us move forward into where God is leading us — out of our faithless, merciless, and hateful past

– and into the eternal quality of life through Lent into Easter is as inevitable as God's grace leading to Jesus' resurrection from the dead, so let us walk this path and find life with Jesus, our Lord.
