

“Let us fear the Lord our God, who gives the rain in its season, the autumn rain and the spring rain, and keeps for us the weeks appointed for the harvest.” - Jeremiah 5:24

While they still have some color, the yellows and reds of the leaves are gradually shifting to brown. It has been a warm fall, but cold weather is on the horizon. As we turn our attention from harvest and processing fresh fruits into jams, we’re all preparing ourselves for the winter ahead. Birds and squirrels join us in this work, as they make little stores of seeds — acts of hope that trust spring and good forage will come again.

ing into the world. And marvelously, this is in the height of the darkness of the year. We began to glimpse God’s promises being fulfilled in the heart of winter rather than in spring. Darkness has begun to recede (ever-so-slightly), and so we can trust that our hopes will be answered.

So, as you enter into these shortening days, may your hope increase. God’s promises will be fulfilled. We will taste life again.



Pig Roasts and Potlucks



Baby Bleu Salad from Debbie G



Ingredients:

For the Dijon Vinaigrette (I only make half-a-recipe, and is more than enough.)

- ◆ 2 eggs * Baby Bleu Salad * Dijon Vinaigrette * 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
- ◆ 3 TB Dijon mustard * 3 TB honey * 2 small shallots, minced * 2 garlic cloves, minced
- ◆ 1/4 teaspoon salt * 1/4 teaspoon pepper * 1 cup olive oil

Salad

- ◆ 12 ounces salad greens * 2-4 oz bleu cheese, crumbled * 1 pt fresh strawberries or fresh seasonal fruit

Sweet and Spicy Pecans (Takes 45 minutes to make & can be used on any Salad or just to snack on)

- ◆ 1/4 cup sugar * 1 cup warm water * 1 cup pecan halves * 2 tablespoons sugar
- ◆ 1 tablespoon chili powder * 1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper

Instructions:

For the Vinaigrette, whisk the vinegar, Dijon mustard, honey, shallots, garlic, salt and pepper in a bowl. Whisk in the olive oil. You may prepare the vinaigrette up to 1 day in advance and store, covered in the refrigerator.

For the Salad, toss the salad greens with the desired amount of vinaigrette. Top with the strawberries and then the bleu cheese. Sprinkle with Sweet and Spicy Pecans.


For the Pecans, dissolve 1/4 cup sugar in the warm water in a bowl and mix well. Stir in the pecans. Let stand for 10 minutes; drain. Meanwhile combine 2 tablespoons sugar, chili powder and red pepper in a bowl and mix well. Add the pecans and toss to coat. Spread the pecans in a single layer on a lightly greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes - turning each pecan over after 5 minutes, and continue baking; watching carefully that they don't burn! Remove from the oven, and let them stand until cool. The pecans can be prepared in advance and stored in an airtight container. You may chill or freeze the pecans for up to 1 week.

- Diced boneless Pork—2.5 to 3 lbs (trim off fat)
- Put pork in a large plastic bag with flour
- Brown flour-coated meat in skillet with cooking oil
- Use one pound, fresh or canned green chilies and cut them into 1/2 to 1/4 inch pieces.
- Add two crushed garlic cloves.

Salt and Pepper to taste.

Add one quart chicken broth — this makes a large batch
Joy used a large skillet—12 inch diameter and 5 inch deep.
The thickness of the sauce can be controlled with more or less flour.

- Use whole chilies—Joy used Hatch brand Mild.
- Cut off the top and insert you're your favorite cheese.
- Wrap chilies in egg roll wrapper (can be dipped in beaten egg) and cook them in deep-fat.

Fund raising: a pie auction was held on March 19 which raised \$900. On June 10 a silent auction was held which raised \$3,500 for a total budget of \$4,400.

Historical presentation: on Friday evening, September 22, the Legendary Ladies performed a show which highlighted the lives of three prominent women who lived in Colorado during the time that Valmont was founded. This was followed by a presentation by two long-time Valmont members on the history of the church.

Music: live music was provided by Jenna and Phil Blair who played the piano, guitar and drums. And a debut performance with their son Nehemiah on the trumpet.

Food: there was a pig roast with all the appropriate sides, homemade root beer, and lots of desserts.

Activities: a face painter/balloon twister was a huge success. There was also corn toss, Jenga, and word games. Something new for this year was a photo booth that was very popular.

Volunteer hours: we set a goal of providing 160 hours of volunteer work from the congregation in honor of the 160 years of Valmont's existence. We far exceeded this goal by providing 341 volunteer hours.

160 pounds per month of food for Round Pantry: our goal of 160 pounds of food per month for Round Pantry at Westview Presbyterian Church in Longmont fell a little short but we made a large monetary donation at the end of the collection period.

Our pastor, Eric Garner, estimated that there were between 100 and 120 people in attendance. It was a beautiful Colorado day on the patio out by the lake for us to celebrate the founding of our church in 1863.


