"So you must go and make all the nations into disciples. Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Teach them to observe everything I have commanded you. And look: I am with you, every single day, to the very end of the age." -Matthew 28:19-20

Over the years, you have heard me preach on the importance of living a life of discipleship after we've believed in Jesus, received his Spirit, and have sworn allegiance to the government of God. As Paul tells us in Titus 2:11 -14 "God's saving grace, you see, appeared for all people. It teaches us that we should turn our backs on ungodliness and the passions of the world, and should live sober, just, and devout lives in the present age, while we wait eagerly for the blessed hope and royal appearing of the glory of our great God and savior, Jesus the king. He gave himself for us

so that he could ransom us from all lawless actions and purify for himself a people as his very own who would be eager for good works." We aren't meant to be inactive after coming to faith in Christ, but rather are to be a people who are eager for good works.

But what exactly are we to do? Well, taking a lead from Jesus, one of the good works we're to engage in is making disciples of all people. This doesn't simply mean getting them to pray the sinner's prayer so they can go to heaven when they die, but rather it means helping them to become a people who are eagerly following after the way of life begun in Jesus — believing that the message he brings is actually (in both the present and the future) good news.

Most churches have recognized the need for what we call "evangelism;" however, most of our current society has come to be skeptical or hostile towards such idea. Too many people have preconceived notions about what the church stands for, and want nothing to do with us judgmental and hypocritical Christians. Going up to people and telling them that they're sinners in needs of grace just doesn't sound like good news to their ears.

So, how can we be a people who are eager to do the good work of spreading the good news when we find ourselves in a situation where people simply don't want to hear it? How can we fulfill our call to make disciples of all peoples?

I believe that one of the places we need to begin to fulfill the Great Commission today is first and foremost become friends with the people around us. It becomes so easy for us Christians to get complacent within our Christian communities that we never get to know our neighbors in a meaningful way — keeping them at arm's length. We need to get to know the people around us, figuring out their hopes and dreams; their worries and fears. We need to invest our lives in the people of this world if we want to have any hope of knowing how to speak a word to them that might sound like good news.

Along these same lines, we aren't becoming their friends simply because we are trying to convert them — we need to actually be their friends regardless of whether or not we ever get to vocally share the name of Jesus with them. Now, as you spend time together and you discuss what matters to each of you, there will naturally be ways to speak about your faith; however, it will be a natural conversation between friends rather than an argument where you're trying to get them to take on your point of view. But in order for that to work, you truly do need to become their friend. Obviously this is neither quick nor easy,

but it may just become an exciting opportunity of eagerly pursuing the good work of God. It may just be a way for you to realize that Jesus is indeed with you to the very end of the age.

Rhubarb Swirl Pie - from my Grandma Meyer, Debbie G.

It might be late for Rhubarb, but this recipe is worth holding on to. (Or maybe you have some in the freezer, and you can still make it this year!)

You need 3 cups rhubarb cut small and 3/4 cup sugar. Combine and let set 1 hour. Bring to a boil, remove from the heat and add 1 3oz. box of strawberry Jello (I used sugar-free). Make sure Jello dissolves. Let stand until it begins to gel.

Empty 1 small package of vanilla instant pudding in medium to large bowl, add 1 1/2 cups milk, combine and let thicken. Add 8 ounce container of Cool Whip - combine. LASTLY add cooled rhubarb to pudding mixture and mound in baked pie shell.

Easy Pie Crust * 1 1/3 cups flour * 1 still butter or margarine Melt butter in pie pan and add flour. Mix well - form in pie pan.

Bake in 375 until browned - about 12-15 minutes.


Heavenly Father, we come before you today to ask your forgiveness and to seek your direction and guidance. We know Your Word says, "woe to those who call evil good, but that is

Daily Bible reading: Proverbs 22-24 and 1 Corinthians 6.

Our Thoughts Become Our Destiny

(Proverbs 23:7) "For as he thinks in his heart, so is he; Eat and drink, he says to you, but his heart is not with you."

You are what you think. Let us look at how thoughts become who we are in just five steps:

- 1. Be careful what you think, for thoughts become words.
- 2. Be careful what you say, for words become actions.
- 3. Be careful what you do, for actions become habits.
- 4. Be careful of your habits, for habits become character.
- 5. Be careful of your character, for character becomes your destiny.



Martin Luther said, "You cannot keep birds from flying over your head, but you can keep them from building a nest in your hair." It's so true. It has been estimated that the average person has between 50,000 and 70,000 thoughts a day. That's a lot of birds to shoo away.

One answer to helping our self keep our thoughts correct is found in the book of Philippians, "Finally, my brothers, whatever things are true, whatever things are honest, whatever things are right, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report; if there is any virtue and if there is any praise, think on these things" (4:8). We keep our thoughts on what is true, honest, right, and pure.

David said, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my thoughts, (24) and see if any wicked way is in me; and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23-24). There are times when we need God's help in bringing our thoughts under subjection. Remember, our thoughts become our destiny. Things I did not know about the Dead Sea Scrolls until I toured the exhibit hosted by the Denver Museum of Nature & Science by Peggy Moore

I did not know ---

The Dead Sea Scrolls are the oldest Hebrew biblical manuscripts found to date. The 900 manuscripts written in Hebrew, Aramaic, & Greek date from a period 250 years before Christ to 100 years after Christ.

Fragments of all the Books of the Old Testament appear, with the exception of the Book of Esther.

Some scrolls include writings about the history, statutes, & regulations of the mysterious Jewish community that inhabited the Qumran site where the manuscripts were found. That community was known as the Essenes. This Jewish sect was ascetic in nature & had a doctrine dealing with death, judgment, resurrection, & immortality. They would have been the copyists, authors, & preservers of the scrolls. The Book of Isaiah is the best preserved. As I saw them displayed at the Museum, I was amazed at how fragmented but meticulously written on parchment or papyrus. It was interesting to learn that parchment found was not only goat or sheep skin but gazelle or ibex skin. The ink used was carbon based. They were wrapped in linen & tied with skin string & stored in airtight clay jars with lids.

My thought is ---

Such a deliberate but painstaking act of preservation of God's word when Rome was about to destroy the Jewish nation & God's word, is a testimony to God's faithfulness to Jews & Gentiles alike.

I just finished reading a devotional called Rediscover Jesus by Matthew Kelly. He gave some very practical advise on praying. He said many times we don't know how to pray, or we lose focus. He suggested using a prayer process. I have found it very helpful. I hope you do to.

Gratitude: Begin by thanking God in a personal dialogue for whatever you are most grateful for today.

Awareness: Revisit the times in the past twenty-four hours when you were and were not the-best-version-of-yourself. Talk to God about these situations and what you have learned from them.

Significant Moments: Identify something you experienced today and explore what God might be trying to say to you through that event (or person).


Peace: Ask God to forgive you for any wrong you have committed (against yourself, another person, or Him) and to fill you with a deep and abiding peace.

Freedom: Speak with God about how he in inviting you to change your life, so that you can experience the freedom to be the-best-version-of-yourself.

Others: Lift up to God anyone you feel called to pray for today, asking God to bless and guide them.

Finish by praying "The Lord's Prayer".


