This is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says to all those I carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: "Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters; find wives for your sons and give your daughters in marriage, so that they too may have sons and daughters. Increase in number there: do not decrease. Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper."

Jeremiah 29:4-7

Perhaps my favorite thing about the summer months is the opportunity to grow a garden. I love watching the seemingly dead seeds scattered in rows and mounds of dirt. I anticipate seeing the first shoots spring from

the soil to reveal new life. Sprouts rapidly grow into mighty plants, yielding fruit for harvest. And no store-bought tomato will ever taste as good as one from from the garden. Yes, there is the hard work of pulling weeds and fixing irrigations systems, but even those chores leave me feeling good at the end of the day. All of the work of the garden allows for us to take pride in what we eat, knowing that we have partnered with the earth to make it more fruitful than it would have been on its own.

I find it telling that the Bible both begins and ends in a garden. First and second Edens where humans can cultivate the soil to produce good, beautiful, and pleasing food. The first Eden was planted in order for Adam (and later Eve) to work the ground. The second Eden offers a permanent home for both humans and God. The first Eden is undone by sin relating to food. The second Eden offers healing for the nations through the fruit of the Tree of Life.

When we tend our own gardens, we follow after a signpost to this hoped for future without even knowing it. We humans were always meant to get our hands dirty in the soil as a means of stewarding the earth into its fullness of goodness and beauty — to help it be productive. The name *Adam* comes from the Hebrew adamah, which means dirt. This both points to humans being made of dirt in Genesis 2 as well as how we depend upon this dirt to

sustain our lives. As a consequence of this relationship, we are called to care for it and steward it; to bring it to its promised end of being Eden once more. Even for those who find themselves in Exile, (like the Judeans to whom Jeremiah wrote in Babylon) even these exiles are to help make Eden wherever they find themselves. For in sowing a small patch of Eden, we not only bless the earth but the people around us.

So regardless of whether or not you plan on planting a garden this summer, I do pray that you'll sow the future hope of Eden all around you. May this summer be a time to stand with life. May you help people find God by caring for this good earth we've been given.

A Little History About Valmont Submitted by Kathy Houghton

Charles L. Sawhill was an organist for Valmont Community Presbyterian Church beginning in 1909.

Charles was born on the Sawhill family farm in 1899. He began taking piano lessons from a local teacher in 1908, and continued through high school, and then started playing organ.

Besides playing at Valmont he played for fellow residents at Good Samaritan Care Center, and was the organist at the Gateway Masonic Lodge in Denver.

What he really enjoyed playing was classical music including J.S. Bach, Chopin, Brahms and Mozart. Barbara

Leiber (now deceased and a previous member of Valmont) recalled him playing regular hymns at church, and in-between her would play Mozart. "He really loved classical music. He devoted his time and never accepted a cent. It was his way of sharing his love of music with others."

Through Charles' efforts, the church received its first organ from the Masonic Lodge. That first organ burned in the 1979 church fire.

In addition to playing classical music, Charles also enjoyed good "old favorites" as he called them including - When You Wore That Tulip, and Carry Me Back to Old Virginny.

Charles was a man of the world travelling 14 times to Europe between 1950 and 1978 including six trips each to Egypt and Greece, and his last trip was to Alaska.

We will be packing 30 bags (20 for men and 10 for women). Here is the list of the items we need:



The young man from Africa was very happy to receive a toy car & to discover he didn't have to share the contents of the box with anyone—everything in it belonged to him! The young lady from Mexico was touched by the letter that was included, telling her that God loved her. These gifts helped them to know God knew exactly what should be in the boxes they received. All Shoebox recipients I heard were also happy to get school supplies. Thanks

More than 10.5 Million shoeboxes were collected in 2021, with 9.1 million of those coming from the US. As a result of this endeavor, Shoeboxes have been distributed in 135 countries! That's 10.5 million children + their families have been introduced to Jesus through the generosity of "Shoebox packers"! 26,000,000, yes, that's 26 Million, Greatest Journey booklets have been given to children since 2009! Shoeboxes collected and sent from Colorado this past year have gone to Haiti, Zambia, Mexico and Western States Native Americans. Only God knows who will receive a Shoebox and be introduced to Jesus through your endeavors.
