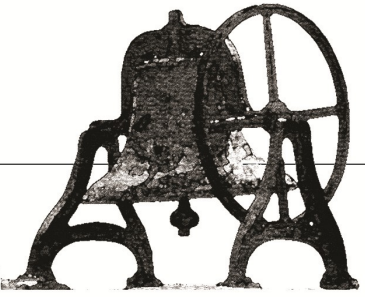

It is difficult to believe that an entire year has passed since moving here to Colorado. You have shared in a number of my trying circumstances as I've faced family deaths, health scares, and the necessary path towards making a new place a home. Thank you for the role you've played in this process.

As I've been reflecting on our past year together, I've been going back over some of the sermons that I've preached, hoping to pull together some coherent thread that has united them. The five major sermon series I've delivered have covered Philippians, The Grand Narrative of Scripture, The Sermon on the Mount, The Lord's Supper, and The Ten Commandments. Looking at these five together, I believe their unifying theme

to be: God is fiercely committed to creation, which can be seen in the mission of Jesus continued in us through the Spirit.

Because of God's desire to rule the earth with humans, God has worked with a fallen world that tends back towards uncreation by inaugurating the covenant with Abraham for the rescue and restoration of the world. Out of faithfulness to the covenant, God liberated the Children of Israel from bondage in Egypt, entered into relationship with them, and gave them the Torah to guide them in how to fulfill the covenant. However, since Israel was also a part of fallen creation, it could not fulfill the Torah; it could not complete the covenant. The Pharisees believed that strict observance of the Torah could accomplish this, so they found every jot and tittle of the law, and made new rules to ensure the Torah would be followed to the letter. But then a new teacher rose up in Israel, one who taught with an authority beyond rules and regulations. Jesus of Nazareth boldly proclaimed that God's Kingdom (the reign of God on earth) was beginning in him -- in this Kingdom proper observance of the Torah wasn't about God being revealed on tablets of stone, but rather God's Spirit being engraved onto human hearts. Israel, however, wanted a

nationalistic Messiah to throw off the yoke of Rome as Moses had led the Hebrews out of Egypt, so they rejected Jesus' enthronement on a cross and submission to enemies. Yet God vindicated Jesus in his Resurrection from the dead and Ascension to be seated at the right hand of the Father. The Spirit has now been given to the Church as the first fruits of New Creation, which has assured us that we are Children of God and Citizens of God's Kingdom. It is now our calling to live out the Christ Life before the world, proclaiming the good news that Jesus is Lord!

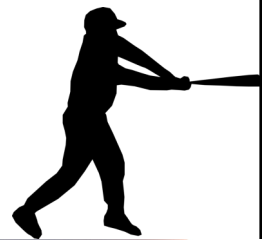

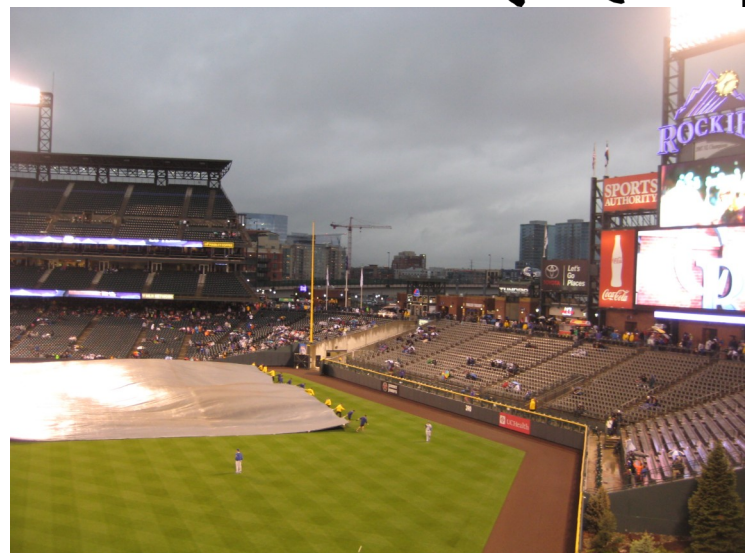

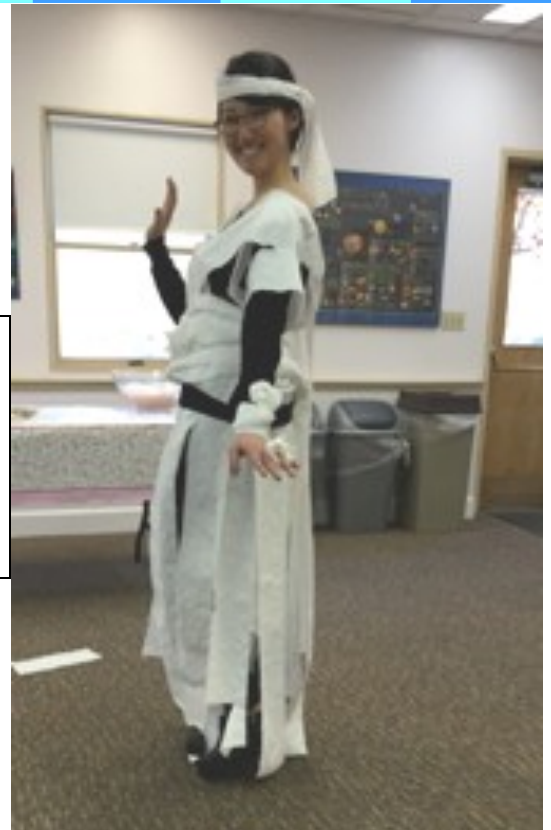

Bags of Grace and Bags for Sleeping

Snow on Mother's Day! Not too unusual for Colorado, and for most of us just a nuisance. But what if you were homeless and living on the street?

Valmont friend, Jaheem Hilts, suggested to the Deacons something that the homeless can really use are lightweight sleeping bags. The Boulder Homeless Shelter Winter Sheltering Program closes at the end of April. That means that the winter shelter clients must spend their nights on the street May through October.

The Deacons found a source of sleeping bags for about \$15 each and ordered 10 bags. They arrived just in time to distribute prior to the snow and cold in mid May. Five of the bags went to The Source, Attention Homes' Runaway & Homeless program for youth on the street. They were very excited to receive them! The rest of the bags went directly to adults on the street and the Bridge House, which serves Boulder's Homeless. The Deacons plan on purchasing more bags for The Source and Bridge House to distribute.

Additionally we put together 35 Bags of Grace for the homeless in May. Thank you so much for supporting this ministry and distributing the bags. Anne

Black Hills Trip



In the 1930s and 1940s, my father worked for Caterpillar tractor out of Denver. One time he had to take an engine up to Mt. Rushmore. He made several trips during the construction. There was also a conservation corp camp in the Black Hills which used Caterpillar tractors. I found a few very small photos that he had taken on those trips. I scanned them and was surprised to find one was an early picture showing George Washington and the start of another head to the right of Washington. In reading, I found that Borglum originally wanted to put Jefferson to Washington's right. The rock kept fracturing when he started working on Jefferson, so Borglum blasted it off and put Jefferson to the left. My father also took the first tractor into Red Rocks to start work on the amphitheater. I have not found any pictures of that.

I showed the pictures to Cindy. Cindy and I decided to take a quick trip of the Black Hills. We enjoyed seeing Crazy Horse Monument and Mt Rushmore. The day we were there was beautiful. The weather during the drive back was less than desirable, but we made it alright. It was a fun trip with lots of laughs!!
