Sometimes I feel inconsolable. The lamentation voiced by Jeremiah seems undeniably true: "A voice is heard in Ramah. It is the sound of weeping and deep sadness. Rachel is weeping for her children. She refuses to be comforted, because they are gone." How do we, a people of hope, recognize both the realcross and resurrection?

Isaiah is something of mystery to me — a prophet who vacillates between a message of condemnation and one of forgiveness; loss and healing. The most notable shift in Isaiah takes place in the 40th chapter when prophet gives voice to the Lord's consolation. Much of the prophesy thus far has spoken an inevitable path towards destruction as Israel profane its worship and denies justice in the land — the conclusion seems inevitable: exile. Yet here, after all these harsh words, the Lord speaks comfort. Even on the course to exile, or on the other side of exile, there remains the Lord's desire to rescue, restore, and reconcile.

As we enter into what promises to be a very heated political season, I will continue to invite you to consider our ultimate hope. No matter what happens in November many of us will be disappointed with outcome — we may even feel inconsolable. Yet in the midst of our consternation about the politics and attitudes of our countrymen, let us remember that we are indeed a people of hope, and that our hope is not cities nor walls; it is not in armies nor economies; our hope is not in

ity of suffering and restoration? The leaders nor parties. No, our hope is in the Lord! And even when we collectively (and individually) walk down the path towards exile, the assurance of the Lord will not be shaken.

> So comfort, comfort the people of Valmont. We live in the day of the Lord's rescue.

Pig Roasts and Potlucks



Blueberry French Toast From Kris Overfelt 's kitchen

Prep: 30 min. Plus chilling Bake: 55 min.

Ingredients:

- 12 slices day-old white bread, crusts removed
- 1 C. Fresh or frozen blueberries
- 2 C.Milk Sauce
- 1 C. sugar

- * 2 T. cornstarch
- 1 C. Fresh or frozen blueberries * 1 T. Butter
- * 1/3 C. maple syrup or honey

* 12 eggs

* 1 C. Water

* 2 pkgs. (8 oz.) cream cheese



Instructions:

Cut bread into 1 in. Cubes: place half in greased 13" x 9" x 2" baking dish. Cut cream cheese into 1" cubes: place over bread. Top with blueberries and remaining bread cubes. In large bowl, beat eggs. And milk and syrup, mix well. Pour over bread mixture. Cover and chill for 8 hours, or overnight.

Remove from refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Cover and bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Uncover, bake 25-30 minutes longer or until center is set.

In small saucepan, combine sugar, cornstarch and water until smooth. Bring to boil over medium heat: cook and stir for 3 minutes. Stir in blueberries: reduce heat. Simmer for 8-10 minutes or until blueberries have burst. Stir in butter until melted. Serve with the Blueberry French Toast. Yields: 6-8 servings (1 3/4 cups sauce)

What if a disaster happened at Valmont church? Are we prepared to con-




quent reason Presbyterian Disaster Assistance responds to a church disaster is because of a fire in the church building?

Of course life is far worse elsewhere, given that about half the world's almost 7,000 languages have zero Scripture. Interestingly, a recent Barna Group survey showed that 72% of Americans believe the Bible is available in *all* languages! And 98% believe that *everyone* should have access to it!!

But the really great news? Access for everyone *is* happening.... Roughly 150 translations are started in Bibleless languages every year and that number is climbing! And many other organizations are working with Wycliffe in what is becoming a global Bible translation *movement*!

HIGHLANDS HIGHLIGTS

Highlands – A Sanctuary for the Spirit, a School for the Mind,

a Joy for the Heart and a Shelter in the Storm.

Summer camps saw 167 campers compared to 183 in 2016. The biggest loss was in Sr. High Campers.....due in part to participation by many youth in the Presbyterian Youth Triennium. Highlands is committed

to providing scholarships so that no one is denied the opportunity to go to summer camp due to the cost. This summer nearly \$10,000 in scholarships were provided.

Highlands partnered with 14 churches to provide day camps at no charge, where they saw 420 children compared to 355 children last year. Four of the partner congregations brought youth to Highlands for a day, bringing 102 children to camp. This is the eighth year for the Partnership Day Camp program.

The Presbytery of Plains and Peaks has granted a \$100,000 matching grant. To date \$62,566.47 has been received towards the matching grant. Please contact Ruth Lewis if you would like more information regarding this matching grant.
