"St. James' Epistle is really an epistle of straw, for it has nothing of the nature of the Gospel about it." — Martin Luther

"What use is it, my dear family, if someone says they have faith when they don't have works? Can faith save such a person? Supposing a brother or sister is without clothing, and is short even of daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; be warm, be full!'—but doesn't give them what their bodies need—what use is that? In the same way, faith, all by itself and without works, is dead." — James 2:14-17

The Protestant Reformation turns 500 this year when we celebrate Luther nailing the 95 Theses to the doors of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on October 31st. From the very beginning, Luther insisted that we are saved by faith alone (Sola Fide) rather than by relying on works of personal righteousness done to merit God's favor. This life of faith in the grace of God undergirds the whole Protestant tradition, and perhaps is best represented by the Reformed tradition from which the Presbyterian Church springs.

So, if we are a people called to live by faith rather than by works, what do we make of the epistle of James? Does it belong in the cannon of Scripture? If we side with tradition, and include it, should it carry an asterisk, denoting it as an *epistle of straw*? Can we learn anything of the Gospel from it, or does it simply heap more law upon us?

Throughout the remainder of the summer we will be asking these questions together as we study the oft-maligned book of James. We will discern whether or not it can stand alongside Pauline theology or our four Gospel accounts. Who knows — it just might help us recognize some blind spots in our reading of the New Testament if we will allow this text to communicate God's Word to us.



Pig Roasts and Potlucks

Strawberry-Cream Cheese Cookies from Cindy's kitchen

Preheat oven to 375°

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 c. flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1/4 c. butter
- 4 oz. cream cheese
- 3/4 c. sugar

- * 1 egg
- * 1 tsp. vanilla
- * 3/4 c. chopped free-dried strawberries (available at Trader Joe's)
- * 2 T. lemon juice
- * 5 oz. white chocolate chips



Cream butter, cheese & sugar together; beat in egg, vanilla & lemon juice. Stir in dry ingredients until well blended. Add chopped berries & chips. Roll into balls and bake 10-12 minutes on parchment-lined baking sheet.



Summer Squash Casserole From Debbie G's kitchen

Ingredients:

- * 1 can whole kernel corn, drained
- * 1 cup fresh tomatoes
- * 2 lbs. yellow summer squash sliced (about 6 cups)
- * 1/2 cup onion, chopped

* 1 can cream of chicken soup

* 1 cup sour cream

- * 1 cup carrots, shredded
- * 1 (8 oz.) pkg. herb seasoned stuffing mix * 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted



In saucepan cook sliced squash and chopped onion in slated boiling water for 5 minutes; drain. Combine soup and sour cream. Stir in shredded carrots. Fold in drained squash and onion. Combine stuffing mix with melted butter. Spread 1/2 of stuffing mix on bottom of 12" x 8" x 2" casserole. Spoon vegetable mixture on top. Sprinkle remaining stuffing over vegetables. Bake at 350 for 25 to 30 minutes or until heated.

Instructions:

Serve: place hot beef slices on bottom part of a split French roll, sprinkle with cheese and top with the other half of the French roll. Serve with broth in small individual bowls for dipping. Makes 8 to 10 servings



Summer Corn Salad From Debbie G's kitchen

Ingredients:

- * 1 can whole kernel corn, drained
- * 1 cup cucumber, peeled and chopped
- * 1/2 cup green or red bell pepper
- * 1/2 cup Italian Salad dressing
- * 1 cup fresh tomatoes
- * 1/2 cup celery, chopped
- * 2 green onions, sliced



Combine all ingredients and chill overnight.

Why was the first man called Adam?

In Hebrew, the name means man or mankind. When God brought Adam to life, he was bringing all Humans to life. The name appears to have been derived from the word "adamah" which means ground or dust—which, of course, is what God used to create Adam. Both words come from the root "adom" meaning red, like the color of the clay from which Adam was made.

Why was the first woman called Eve?


There is some dispute as to the origin of the name. Many scholars believe it comes form the Hebrew Havva, which means life. However, others maintain that it derives from the Sumerian word "ev", meaning rib.

Why was Adam's home called Eden?

Eden is the ancient Sumerian workd for plain. Though that word doesn't exactly summon up visions of paradise, it must be remembered that the garden itself wasn't called Eden, but that "the Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden" (Genesis 2:8)
