Lent has already begun, so this Vintage article cannot quite correspond with that pensive season of the Church. Easter will spring forth from the grave of Holy Week before this issue of the Vintage has run its course; however, being as though we are currently in Lent, I hardly feel as though I can write to the resurrection-activity of that season before we've arrived there.

I am at an impasse.

Sometimes that in between space is where we find ourselves — neither quite mourning nor rejoicing. Sometimes this is because everything is going along much as we'd expect, so there is nothing to ruffle our feathers. Sometimes this is because we just don't feel strongly enough about anything to warrant a strong emotional response. What are

we supposed to do when everything just is?

The adult education class on Sunday's at 9:00am has just begun studying the book of Acts, that explosive and exciting tale of the Church's early years; how it moved out of Jerusalem, into Judea, then Samaria, and finally to the ends of the earth. However, before any of those dramatic events could unfold. they first had to sit around and wait for the Holy Spirit to come and empower them. We have no sense that they knew how long to wait — how long they'd have to consider what their mission might look like. They spend these days rehashing the events that led up to Jesus' crucifixion and choose someone replace Judas as an Apostle. Administrative work rather than the bold mission they'd been commissioned to fulfill.

This might not have seemed like the most exciting or pressing work to accomplish following the Lord of Life being raised from the dead. They were done with their mourning over his death, and perhaps even their excitement over his being raised had slightly waned since they weren't yet doing what they hoped to do. However, there is a little statement in Acts 1:14 that spoke to me about what to do in the impasse when we don't know exactly what do next:

"They all joined together constantly in prayer."

It will not always be clear to us what we need to do in the moment — whether to mourn or rejoice: whether to act or to wait. However, there is always one thing that we can do which will help us as a community be dialed into the Lord's call upon our lives — we can constantly devote ourselves to prayer.

So, whether you're reading this in Lent or in Easter, this word applies. Let us consider how the Lord is calling us in this moment as we devote ourselves to prayer.

# Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Mission Project -- April 22-28, 2018

A group of us from Presbytery will be driving to Oklahoma to help one or more families who have been unable to



live in their homes due to storm damage. They have been out of their homes for almost 3 years, but due to circumstances have been unable to rebuild on their own. We will be helping them to rebuild. Experienced builders are always in demand! What if you'd like to help, but do not have any prior building experience? No problem!! We have many wonderful handymen on our team who are more than willing (and patient) in explaining the details of a project. I've learned how to use a power nailer to install new subfloors, how to

tile both walls and floors, how to install laminate flooring, and roof a house. No prior experience is needed, just a willingness to learn. We will be assigned our project(s) and lodging when it gets closer, so until then I can't really give you more specifics.

Until we learn more about our lodging, we won't know if a couple of dedicated cooks will be useful or not. In past years, when we've not stayed at a church camp with a dining hall, we've needed to leave work early in order to prepare dinner. The couple of years that we had people who signed up to cook for us were marvelous!

The cost is usually pretty low, as we carpool down and back, have inexpensive lodging and prepare most of our meals. The costs are divided among the participants. We'll know more as the time gets closer.

# Apricot Walnut Bars From Deb G. kitchen



#### **Ingredients:**

1 cup flour

- \* 1/4 cup sugar
- \* 1 stick butter

\* 2 eggs

\* 1 cup brown sugar

1 tsp. Vanilla

\* 1/2 tsp. Baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

- \* 1/3 cup flour
- \* 1 heaping cup chopped pecans

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

1 cup of cut up dried apricots

Mix flour and sugar, cut in butter. Pat into an 8x8 or 9x9?pan. Bake 25 minutes or until light brown. Remove



from oven, set aside. Place cut up dried apricots in a two cup Pyrex measuring cup. Barely cover with water and microwave about two minutes; until just boiling, drain well and set aside. Beat eggs, brown sugar, Vanilla until well blended. In a separate bowl mix; flour, Baking powder & salt. Add to egg mixture till moistened. Add pecans and drained apricots. Pour over shortbread layer. Bake for 30 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut into 1 1/2 inch squares, and dust with powdered sugar.



Watchman Nee, or Ni Tuosheng (Chinese: 倪柝声; pinyin: Ní Tuòshēng; November 4, 1903 – May 30, 1972), was a church leader and Christian teacher who worked in China during the 20th century. ... He established churches throughout China and held many conferences to train Bible students and church workers.

The book is "Sit, Walk, Stand". He explains how in Ephesians the apostle Paul directs the Christian walk as first Sit vs:2:6. Walk vs:4:1 and then we are able to Stand vs:6:11. We have a tendency to get the sequence backwards.

This is a thin book of only 64 pages with a wealth of help to us as we pursue our Christian life. Take a look in the classroom shelves but be careful, you might find a different book that catches your eye.

An unforgettable story of primitive jungle treachery in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

How do you tell a cannibal about love? Headhunting cannibals who used their victims' skulls as pillows, the Sawi people of New Guinea seem to be living in the Stone Age. The heroes of Sawi legend weren't those who took the greatest number of heads in battle or ambush, but those who were the most deceitful in befriending their victims before they took their heads. It was to these people that Don and Carol Richardson went in 1962, risking their lives to share the gospel and tell of the true Peach Child, a figure the Sawis knew vaguely from their own mythology. I encourage you to pick up the book from the table in back, sorry there is only one so bring it back for others. It is an amazing and eventually heartwarming story. – Don Lewis






# **Our New Kitchen**

# **Praying for Stephen**


Commissioning for Stephen Bird as he has joined and trained to be a first responder with PDA—Presbyterian Disaster Assistance


